Here, Michael outlines the importance of planning for progression, the 'pillars' of phonics, grammar and vocabulary in language learning, and some findings from curriculum inspections (languages) of outstanding primary schools.	Dr Michael Wardle Michael Wardle is one of Her Majesty's Inspectors and subject lead for languages for Ofsted. Previously he was a headteacher at a 11-18 school in Durham City, which had been a language college. In the past he coordinated Languages CPD across the North-East of England for Comenius and wrote training materials for CILT on primary upskilling and vocational programmes 16-19. He has authored German and French textbooks, acted as editor for ALL French language journal Francophonie and more recently advised the Department for Education as 'policy fellow'. Michael has experience working with primary, secondary, and special schools of all types, and alternative provisions, including PRUs. He also leads local area SEND inspections.
